ONCOLOGY

ADVANCING CANCER CARE

It's happening here: CentraState offers world-class procedures and innovative tools to fight cancer.

CentraState is delivering the type of advanced cancer care you'd find in a major metropolitan cancer center, paired with the personal touch of a community-based healthcare system. This level of care has been driven by the efforts of a skilled multidisciplinary team under the guidance of a **Alexander Itskovich**, **MD** (pictured above center), hepatobiliary and advanced gastrointestinal (GI) surgeon and medical director of the Statesir Cancer Center at CentraState.

Renowned physicians in cancer subspecialties such as endocrinology and neurology are providing care at CentraState, alongside a strong core clinical team. Highly intricate surgical procedures are available to provide new hope for patients with difficult-to-treat cancers. Patients have access to new clinical trials, along with high-risk cancer assessment and genetics programs that can detect cancer at its earliest stages.

"We're building high-caliber teams around our patients to solve complex problems," says Dr. Itskovich. "We're offering world-class services right here at CentraState."



Unique HIPEC Protocol Is Extending Lives

A highly advanced, two-phase surgery now available at CentraState may extend lives substantially for certain patients with abdominal-related cancers. Hyperthermic intraperitoneal chemotherapy, or **HIPEC**, combines tumor removal surgery with a heated, concentrated chemotherapy bath inside the abdomen, battling cancer directly at its source.

HIPEC is typically only available in high-volume, metropolitan cancer centers, and Dr. Itskovich has brought the procedure to CentraState – making the hospital one of just a few in New Jersey to offer this treatment. Candidates may include patients with stage four cancer that has spread into the abdominal cavity, including appendiceal cancer, peritoneal mesothelioma (cancer of the abdominal lining), certain colon and ovarian cancers, and some gastric cancers.

With surgery alone for these types of intraabdominal cancers, it can be nearly impossible to remove every cancer cell. However, the heated chemotherapy solution bathes the abdomen to kill residual cancer cells and reduce the chances of recurrence. The surgery requires an incredible collaborative approach with more than 50 team members working together on complex protocols.

Gerald J. Glasser Brain Tumor Center Partners with CentraState

As part of CentraState's partnership with Atlantic Health System, fellowship-trained neuro-oncologist **© Robert Aiken**, **MD**, is now

available to see patients at CentraState, a new satellite location for the Gerald J. Glasser Brain Tumor Center. Board-certified in neurology and neuro-oncology, Dr. Aiken specializes in the diagnosis and management of patients with benign and cancerous tumors of the brain, skull, spine, and spinal cord.

With extensive expertise that includes clinical research, Dr. Aiken serves as co-director of the Gerald J. Glasser Brain Tumor Center – ranked No. 1 for neurosurgery in NY, NJ, CT, and PA and among the top 5 percent of the nation's neuroscience programs for five years in a row. In addition to treating patients at the Statesir Cancer Center at CentraState, he is collaborating with oncologists, neurosurgeons, and other CentraState specialists to ensure a seamless continuum of care and is facilitating opportunities for patients to participate in brain tumor clinical trials.

"We're offering patients a very modern approach to neurooncology treatment, with access to comprehensive care and the latest clinical trials close to home," says Dr. Aiken. "With this level of care and convenience, patients don't need to travel to New York or Philadelphia."

A Closer Look at the Lungs

An **endobronchial ultrasound (EBUS) bronchoscopy** performed by interventional pulmonologists at CentraState is one of the quickest and most precise ways to diagnose lung cancer for people at high risk, such as smokers, individuals over age 65, or those with abnormal-looking lymph nodes detected through imaging tests.

In the past, screenings have been limited to the airway. EBUS bronchoscopy goes beyond the airway to provide a safe way to visualize the lymph nodes and lungs using a small, flexible scope equipped with a special video camera and ultrasound device. This technology can capture images to evaluate areas that may not be seen with scans or X-rays, and it can also be used to obtain image-guided biopsies.





Minimally Invasive Surgery for Liver Cancer

The liver's large blood vessels and complex anatomy can make tumor removal challenging, especially with open surgery. CentraState is one of the few hospitals in the state to remove liver tumors with **minimally invasive liver lobectomy**, which reduces the risk of bleeding while offering a shorter hospital stay and a quicker recovery. Depending on the needs of the individual patient, the procedure can be performed laparoscopically or robotically using the da Vinci Surgical System.

HIGH-RISK CANCER SCREENING PROGRAMS

People at high risk for certain types of cancer need a different monitoring strategy. CentraState offers the following high-risk screening programs to help detect cancer early, when it's most treatable.

Pancreatic cancer screening

CentraState offers pancreatic cancer screening for individuals whose family history puts them at a higher risk of pancreatic cancer. Patients who don't qualify for screening based on family history alone may be referred for genetic testing to determine if they are at high risk. If a patient qualifies for screening, next steps include an MRI of the pancreas and a personalized care plan based on those results.

Lung cancer screening

CentraState's low-dose CT scan lung screening program can detect lung cancer at its earliest stages, even before symptoms start. CT scans can detect nodules as small as 1 to 2 millimeters, and these tiny nodules can then be tracked for changes and growth. Low-dose CT screenings are available every year for those who have no symptoms of lung cancer and meet criteria related to age and smoking history.

Breast cancer screening

A mammogram at CentraState now comes with insight on whether a patient is at high risk for breast cancer. The high-risk breast cancer program employs the Tyrer-Cuzick risk assessment tool, which examines broad factors to calculate the ten-year and lifetime risks of developing breast cancer. Those at high risk receive a personalized care plan, which may include semi-annual office visits, supplemental imaging, and genetic testing.

More Convenient Mammograms

To make preventive health care more convenient and accessible for women, CentraState offers mammograms with no prescription. Patients age 40 or older with no symptoms who are due for a routine mammography can simply make an appointment with the Star and Barry Tobias Women's Health Center. Self-referred mammography is covered by most insurances, just as it would be with a physician prescription.




Complex Surgery Treats Pancreatic Cancer

A surgical intervention called the **Whipple procedure** can be a very real lifeline for patients with certain types of pancreatic cancer. During this complex procedure, the head of the pancreas, the gallbladder, the duodenum (the first part of the small intestine), and part of the stomach are removed. Then, the bile duct, the remaining portion of the pancreas, and the remaining portion of the stomach are reconnected to the small intestine so that food can be digested as usual.

"It's like rearranging the entire plumbing of the digestive system," explains Alexander Itskovich, MD, who has been performing the procedure for nearly a decade and now offers it at CentraState with the support of a multidisciplinary team. "It's a difficult procedure because it's performed in a compact area with multiple organs and a maze of large blood vessels that tumors like to invade. In addition, suturing the pancreas is like sewing gelatin, so it requires a special technique."

The procedure, which can take up to 12 hours, helps prevent cancer from spreading to other organs and is the only known cure for certain pancreatic tumors.

CentraState is expanding its endocrinology services into a regional destination for endocrine care.





A New Era in Endocrine Surgery

Renowned endocrine surgeon Alexander L. Shifrin, MD, joined the staff of Surgical Associates of CentraState and CentraState Healthcare System as surgical director of endocrinology. Dr. Shifrin specializes exclusively in the diagnosis and surgical treatment of thyroid, parathyroid, and adrenal cancers and benign conditions, from common to complex. He has performed thousands of endocrine surgeries

over his career, including the most advanced minimally invasive procedures.

Dr. Shifrin provides streamlined care in collaboration with CentraState's network of endocrinologists, oncologists, and other specialists. A national leader in his field, he sees patients from throughout the region and across the country. Dr. Shifrin has been instrumental in prestigious clinical trials and is a prolific author, having written or contributed to dozens of textbooks and other publications on endocrine surgery. As part of my philosophy of care, I work closely with patients to factor in life circumstances and ensure personalized treatment with a high comfort level," says Dr. Shifrin. "I'm pleased to be working collaboratively with the CentraState team to expedite and advance endocrine care."



ENDOCRINE SURGERY CENTER TO OPEN

As part of CentraState's commitment to offering the most comprehensive endocrine surgery program in New Jersey, construction has been completed on a state-of-the-art facility that will house the hospital's **Endocrine Surgery Center** at 55 Willow Lane in Marlboro. Scheduled to open this spring, the Endocrine Surgery Center will be led by Dr. Shifrin and an expanding team of endocrinology and interdisciplinary specialists who will broaden access to vital care for conditions ranging from thyroid, parathyroid, and adrenal disorders to endocrine cancers and hereditary endocrine syndromes. This patient-centered facility will be equipped with the latest technology, including the ability to perform in-office ultrasound-guided biopsies.

CentraState Convenes Endocrinology Experts

CentraState convened national and international experts in endocrinology at its first **Endocrine Symposium**, with physicians and other healthcare professionals from across the region in attendance. Participants learned the latest diagnostic approaches and treatment modalities for patients with adrenal, thyroid, and parathyroid diseases and cancers.

NOVEL APPROACHES IN NEUROSCIENCE

Tailored care and advanced treatments are available for patients with complex neurological needs.

Taking a Stance Against Parkinson's Disease

Terry Marcus is a big fan of Rock Steady Boxing, because it's helping him in the fight of his life. The program – a collaboration between CentraState's OceanFirst Rehabilitation Center and CentraState Fitness & Wellness Center – is designed to help those with Parkinson's disease maintain or improve their strength, coordination, and balance. Rock Steady Boxing celebrated its fifth anniversary in 2022, and Terry, an Old Bridge resident, is one of more than 200 participants to date.

Through Rock Steady Boxing, Terry was referred to the Charles Kaempffer Parkinson's Program (see page 18), part of CentraState's Movement Disorders Program. Overseen by neurologist Jia Zhen Cheng, MD, these programs help detect and manage neurodegenerative issues early, when treatment is most effective. The individualized treatment plans developed by Dr. Cheng can include medication, referrals to subspecialists, and physical, occupational, or speech therapy. Since beginning his coordinated care at CentraState in 2020, Terry has improved his flexibility and ability to walk.

A TREATMENT OPTION FOR TREMORS

Deep brain stimulation (DBS) is a treatment that can help patients with essential tremor or Parkinson's disease experience tremors less frequently and often decrease tremor medications. The procedure is available to CentraState patients through the hospital's partnership with Atlantic Health System's Overlook Medical Center.



DBS helps "reprogram" the portion of the brain that controls movement so that the brain's electric signals fire in a more regulated pattern. The procedure involves carefully placing electrodes within the brain through a pre-designated route and implanting a pulse generator – a device similar to a pacemaker – under the skin of the chest to control the electrical current. A few weeks after surgery, neurologist **③ Jia Zhen Cheng, MD** begins programming the device and calibrating the signal to ensure that the current is properly programmed to optimally alleviate symptoms.

"After DBS, 80 to 90 percent of patients see improved clinical symptoms, reduce their use of related medications, and enjoy a better quality of life," says Dr. Cheng.

New Neurosurgeon Joins Medical Staff



Board-certified neurosurgeon Shamik Chakraborty, MD, recently joined the CentraState medical staff and

the Princeton Brain, Spine, & Sports Medicine team. Dr. Chakraborty has advanced training in brain and spine tumors, complex spine surgery, and minimally invasive spine treatments, and he has received the Healthgrades Neurosciences Excellence Award for superior clinical outcomes in stroke care and cranial neurosurgery.

Dr. Chakraborty is highly skilled in using **neuronavigation**, a 3D navigation system available at CentraState that enables safer and more precise treatment of brain tumors and other conditions. The system allows the comparison of real-time 3D images during surgery to preoperative MRIs. Because the brain can shift during procedures, this level of detail can help surgeons better preserve neurological function and improve patient outcomes.

HEALING THE HEART

A higher level of lifesaving interventional cardiology care is happening here.



Saving Lives Through Emergency Angioplasty

Research has shown that when a heart attack happens, patients have the best chance of recovery if their arteries are opened emergently. That lifesaving care is available at CentraState through a procedure called **emergency angioplasty**, also known as emergency percutaneous coronary intervention (PCI).

The procedure requires licensing approval from the New Jersey Department of Health – and CentraState was recently awarded this designation for meeting all necessary qualifications in its new, state-ofthe-art Cardiovascular Interventional Laboratory. The approval builds on the medical center's accreditation as a Chest Pain Center and its longstanding expertise in performing interventional procedures such as cardiac catheterization.

Through emergency angioplasty, CentraState's interventional cardiology team can quickly locate a blockage in a patient having a heart attack, restore blood flow to the heart, and minimize or prevent heart damage through a minimally invasive technique called balloon angioplasty. This lifesaving treatment is available at CentraState 24/7.

A TRACK RECORD OF

CentraState opened its 9,300-square-foot **Cardiovascular** Interventional Laboratory in 2022 to centralize cardiac catheterization, endovascular, and interventional radiology services while adding capacity to serve a greater number of patients. Since 2005, the hospital's experienced interventional cardiologists have been performing cardiac catheterization – a procedure that provides a more complete picture of heart and blood vessel anatomy than imaging alone – with excellent outcomes and patient satisfaction.

Using cardiac catheterization, interventional cardiologists thread a catheter from the wrist or groin to the heart to quickly and accurately diagnose heart problems. At CentraState, 90 percent of cardiac catheterizations are performed via a blood vessel in the wrist, which is more comfortable for patients and has a shorter recovery.

"We're expanding access to care for the many people affected by cardiovascular disease," says **S Jatinchandra Patel**, **DO** (pictured above center), medical director of the Cardiovascular Interventional Laboratory at CentraState. "At the same time, the ability to perform emergency angioplasty is a great benefit to the community. We're shortening that critical time-to-treatment window, allowing people who show signs of a heart attack to receive immediate treatment at CentraState."



CentraState Hosts Cardiovascular Symposium

CentraState provided a robust cardiovascular disease continuing education opportunity at its third annual Cardiovascular Symposium. The event centered on the importance of collaborative care efforts in managing stroke as well as how advances in cardiovascular medicine can transform care.

CentraState offers a full range of additional high-tech surgeries and procedures.

Specialized Hip Surgery Can Delay Arthritis

Hip arthroscopy, a minimally invasive hip pain procedure that has typically only been available at large metropolitan hospitals, is now available at CentraState. This highly specialized surgery can slow or prevent the progression of arthritis in the hip and potentially postpone the need for a hip replacement. The procedure is most often used to treat a condition called impingement, which is when the hip ball and socket no longer rotate with ease.

To perform the delicate procedure, a surgeon inserts a camera called an arthroscope, along with surgical tools, through three small incisions on the hip to clear the



impingement. In most cases, patients can have hip arthroscopy early in the morning and be home by lunch.

"This procedure can improve quality of life for patients and keep them feeling healthier for longer," says CentraState orthopedic surgeon Garret Sobol, MD. "It's a win-win for our patients with hip pain, as they can now receive this specialized care close to home."

Disc Replacement Without Fusion

When conservative treatments don't relieve pain, surgery may be needed to treat a herniated disc or other disc problems of the spine and neck. Traditionally, an anterior cervical discectomy and fusion (ACDF) is performed to remove a herniated disc and replace it with a spacer, which locks movement in that joint and requires the joints above and below it to work harder.


CentraState orthopedic surgeons offer an alternative option: **disc replacement surgery**. This minimally invasive technique replaces the disc with an implant that mimics natural function without fusing the bones together. With no plates or screws required, disc replacement surgery preserves the spine's normal range of motion while decreasing recovery time from three months to several weeks.

BACK ON BOARD AFTER FOOT SURGERY

Lifelong competitive surfer **O** Joanie Sapienza of Manasquan had just finished a surfing session with friends when she jumped on a skateboard and slipped off, twisting her foot. A CT scan showed six fractures and a tear of the Lisfranc ligament, one of three ligaments in the middle foot that helps keep the foot stable.

Understanding Joanie's passion for surfing, CentraState podiatrist Alison DeWaters, DPM, researched the best solution. To reduce the risk of arthritis and retain function, she used a flexible approach called a **mini-TightRope**[™]. During this procedure, two buttons connected by fiber wire are placed across the bones and ligaments to stabilize them while they heal. The wire doesn't need to be removed, so patients can return to physical activity more quickly than with traditional approaches. With the help of physical therapy, Joanie was stand-up paddleboarding and getting used to using her feet again within four months. Soon after, she leashed up and paddled out into the ocean.

"I don't act my age, and I don't want to," Joanie says. "I want to keep my active lifestyle as long as I can – and luckily, I'm back to what I love."



COUPLE SHARES

Now a combined 200 pounds lighter, **Daniel and Marie Anderson** have a second chance at a healthier life after bariatric surgery. The Burlington County couple underwent gastric sleeve surgery one week apart with Seun Sowemimo, MD, medical director of CentraState's **Bariatric Surgery Program**, who notes that having a supportive partner in the process can be a real advantage.

CentraState's program came highly recommended through friends, so they were more than willing to make the hour-long commute for their appointments. Since their surgeries, they've adopted the healthy lifestyle strategies needed for long-term success.

"It's one of the best decisions we've ever made," says Marie. "We supported each other through the surgery, and now we get to build this amazing new life together."

Rapid Relief for Enlarged Prostate

Prostatic hyperplasia (BPH), also known as enlarged prostate, is a common condition in men that can block the flow of urine out of the bladder and cause bladder, urinary tract, or kidney problems, along with urinary symptoms. Prescription medicines may not provide adequate relief and can cause side effects. But the minimally invasive **UroLift® 2 System**, available at CentraState, provides rapid, lasting relief.

During the outpatient procedure, tiny implants are placed to hold open the obstructed urethra that's blocking urine flow. The procedure treats the blockage directly, instead of treating its symptoms. As a result, it doesn't require ongoing medication or the removal of prostate tissue.



"This technology allows us to perform the procedure in just a few minutes, so the total time spent at the hospital is only two to four hours rather than days," says CentraState urologist **Troy Sukkarieh**, MD. "Our patients have been very pleased with the

Bariatric Center of Excellence

Excellence CentraState has been accredited as a Center of Excellence in Metabolic and Bariatric Surgery by the Surgical Review Corporation (SRC), a nonprofit patient safety organization that develops and administers best-in-class accreditation programs. The program features board-certified, fellowship-trained bariatric surgeons and robust bariatric patient education, support, and fitness programs. In addition,

34 CentraState team members are certified as Bariatric Care Specialists – more than any other organization certified by SRC to date.

EXPANDING ACCESS TO CARE

From training physicians of the future to focusing on inequities, CentraState is broadening care access.

EPICADVENTURE

STREAMLINED ACCESS TO

In an extensive collaborative undertaking as part of its partnership with Atlantic Health System, CentraState implemented the **Epic electronic health record (EHR)** platform and trained hospital-wide staff in its use. The platform improves efficiency and safety in care delivery by providing physicians across specialties and practices access to up-to-date medical records and enabling them to work more cohesively to provide optimal care for patients. Epic includes a patient portal called **MyChart**, an interactive health management tool that enables patients to securely manage and receive health information 24/7. Patients can now use MyChart to access their medical records, schedule appointments, request prescription refills, view test results, communicate with their care team, and more.



Maternal Health Initiative Focuses on Access

As a Healthcare Transformation Consortium (HTC) member with Atlantic Health System and several other hospitals and health systems, CentraState is participating in a statewide program with **Wildflower Health**, a leading women's health solutions company, to improve maternal health outcomes in New Jersey. This partnership is also focused on reducing care inequities for New Jersey women of color, who face higher rates of maternal mortality.

As part of this initiative, patients will have access to a mobile app designed by Wildflower to provide a personalized care journey for expecting moms and families, with features such as health tools and trackers. In addition, the initiative includes health advocacy services to help moms more effectively connect to care during and after pregnancy.



A PHYSICIAN GRADUATING CLASS UNLIKE ANY OTHER

The Rutgers Robert Wood Johnson Medical School **Family Medicine Residency Program at CentraState** has prepared many young physicians to excel as family medicine providers, but the 16th graduating class was unique. Members of the class of 2022 were just nine months into their internship year when the pandemic started, and their response was phenomenal, according to program director Maria Ciminelli, MD. The graduating class of this three-year program had more than 5,000 adult and 1,500 pediatric Emergency Department and hospital encounters, with more than 1,000 COVID-19 hospital encounters.

"The pandemic transported us to a very different world, especially within the practice of medicine," says Dr. Ciminelli. "Our 2022 graduates took care of CentraState's sickest COVID patients as part of the ICU COVID-19 response team. They met challenges in stride and learned a tremendous amount about teamwork, resiliency, and adaptability."

Medical Loan Assistance

To improve regional access to primary care and ease the financial burden of medical education payments for young physicians, CentraState family medicine residents have access to a **Physician Loan Assistance Program** when they commit to employment by an Atlantic Health System hospital or partner, including CentraState. The program provides qualified residents with up to \$110,000 of medical loan repayment.

Immediate Care Locations Within Reach

Through CentraState's partnership with Atlantic Health System, patients have access to Immediate Care urgent care centers in **Brick**, **Toms River**, **Marlboro**, **Hazlet**, **Red Bank**, **and East Windsor**. Combining high-quality care with the convenience of a walk-in medical office, these sites are open seven days a week, including most holidays.

Staffed with a multidisciplinary team, Immediate Care treats acute and chronic illnesses and injuries and provides walk-in radiology and laboratory services. Online check-in and telehealth visits are also available. For patients who already use CentraState or Atlantic Health System doctors and services, full medical records can be quickly and securely accessed through the Epic electronic health record system.



Construction is underway for new CentraState Health Pavilions in Jackson and Farmingdale, which will offer one-stop shopping for health services ranging from physician care to lab services and physical therapy.

NURSING EXCELLENCE BENEFITS THE COMMUNITY

CentraState is in an elite group of less than 2 percent of hospitals in the nation to earn **Magnet® recognition** from the American Nurses Credentialing Center (ANCC) four times, which attests to its excellence in nursing and benefits the community in countless ways. Magnet-designated hospitals are regarded as the pinnacle of nursing practice, leadership, and innovation, and they continually seek to raise the bar for patient care.

In 2022, CentraState nurses adopted a new shared governance structure to further empower nurses at all levels to improve patient outcomes, and a new Professional Practice Model to underscore how nurses practice, collaborate, and communicate. These principles were showcased during the implementation of the Epic electronic health record, which has provided nurses in particular with tools to enhance patient safety, streamline care, and spend more time at the bedside.

Community Health Needs Assessment

In 2022, CentraState completed a Community Health Needs Assessment to help pinpoint the evolving healthcare needs of the community. This assessment, conducted every three years, incorporates data gleaned from **more than 450 community members** through robust surveys and interviews, along with other sources. It covers a wide range of topics related to healthcare needs, access, and socioeconomic issues.

Areas of opportunity identified in the 2022 assessment included topics related to cancer, heart disease, behavioral health, nutrition, physical activity, and weight. CentraState has analyzed the results and developed an implementation plan that prioritizes significant health needs and will guide community health improvement efforts in the coming years.



Vaccination Clinics Protect the Community

Beyond delivering evidencebased care for those with COVID-19 and safeguarding the healthcare system for all those who have entered its doors throughout the pandemic, CentraState offered 239 on-site and community vaccine clinics

and provided more than 11,000 COVID-19 vaccine doses in 2022. The CentraState team has also worked with various community organizations, churches, and state entities to ensure that hard-to-reach and underserved populations have access to COVID-19 and flu vaccines. CentraState has administered **more than 88,000 COVID-19 vaccine doses** since the start of the pandemic.



CentraState Remembers and Honors Veterans

CentraState proudly joined the Monmouth County Sheriff's Office, the Vietnam Veterans of America NJ Shore Area Chapter 12, and other organizations to serve as a procession site for a final Salute to Arms during the **Military Honors for Forgotten Veterans** event in June. Team members and volunteers carried flags to honor the sacrifice made by 16 honorably discharged veterans and two spouses from the WWII, Korean, and Cold War eras as they made their way to Brigadier

General William C. Doyle Memorial Cemetery in Wrightstown for interment with military honors. CentraState also participated in the Freehold Memorial Day Parade and held a celebration on Veterans Day to recognize and thank its own veterans and reservists.



LGBTQ+ Initiatives Promote Equitable Care

As part of CentraState's focus on reducing healthcare disparities among marginalized populations, the hospital's LGBTQ+ Inclusion Committee helps ensure that all people have access to compassionate, quality care in a supportive, welcoming environment. In 2022, these efforts included hosting several free

lectures for healthcare professionals. The Committee also celebrated Pride Month by promoting awareness about equitable care, and CentraState illuminated the hospital with rainbow floodlights and displayed a Pride flag.

2022 HEALTH EDUCATION AND SCREENINGS AT A GLANCE

The Star and Barry Tobias Health Awareness Center and the Live Life Well program had 39,489 participant encounters to enhance health and wellness.

A total of 15,863 people attended health fairs and events.

Health coaching services benefited 1,244 new on-demand wellness class members and 392 people with heart failure, and health coaches provided 197 hypertension encounters.

A total of 1,733 health screenings, including 277 cancer screenings, were provided to facilitate early detection of health issues.

CentraState provided 1,076 diabetes education encounters and 779 glucose screenings to check for prediabetes and diabetes.

A total of 1,698 people received lifesaving CPR training, including basic life support, advanced life support, and pediatric advanced life support.

CentraState provided 1,849 student education encounters on topics including wellness, life skills, and health careers.



HEALTHCARE PROFESSIONALS

CentraState facilitates several programs that help young people learn about health professions.



In collaboration with Freehold Regional High School District, CentraState hosted 339 **Health Profession Pathway Students** in the 2021-2022 and 2022-2023 programs, helping Freehold and Manalapan sophomores, juniors, and seniors learn about a range of career options.

CentraState Employee Relations Business Partner Tina Valente and Director of Dining Services Norma Dorer provide an interactive demonstration for Health Profession Pathway Students. CentraState is a participating site for the **Boy Scouts Health Care Career Explorers** program, which provides interactive education, hands-on experiences, and hospital tours for high school students to learn about healthcare careers. In 2022, CentraState hosted 46 students, with 570 students participating over the past seven years.



More than 100 students in the 2022-2023 **Medical Sciences Magnet Program** at Freehold High School have had the opportunity to participate in career days, lectures, and a senior externship program to shadow healthcare providers at CentraState.

Federal and State Funding to Enhance Care

The community will now benefit from access to **stereotactic radiosurgery (SRS)**, thanks to the efforts of Rep. Chris Smith, who championed funding as part of congressional spending bills for 2023. The House Appropriations Committee of Congress approved \$615,000 to upgrade equipment at CentraState to enable this state-of-the-art procedure, which is used to treat primary and metastatic brain and spine cancers, epilepsy, other neurological conditions. In addition, thanks to the efforts of State Senator Vin Gopal in championing an appropriation request, seniors throughout the region will have access to an **expanded falls prevention program**. CentraState received a \$250,000 State Budget Appropriation grant to purchase equipment that has been shown to reduce falls and fall-related injuries by up to 35 percent, with software that enhances the ability to distinguish between a patient's intentional movements vs. movements associated with a fall.



Supporting Voting Rights

The League of Women Voters has a core belief that quality health care at an affordable cost should be available to all U.S. residents, which aligns with CentraState's strategic initiatives. As a strong supporter of voting rights, CentraState was proud to host a press conference announcing the formation of the League of Women Voters of Monmouth County from three individual local leagues – Greater Red Bank, Southern Monmouth, and Western Monmouth. This merger is designed to expand and streamline their ability to carry out their mission of empowering voters and protecting democracy.




